Regional Competition 2022

Contest for 2022 will be unique as we are in unique times. A video contest has never been done in Region 6 but we are excited and very proud of all choruses and quartets who step up to the challenge. There will be scores for the International division, grades for the Open Division and feedback for the Evaluation Only. We all may not be as practiced as we are used to being, but we will be the very best we can be. We look forward to seeing everyone "on stage".

The 2022 Competition Handbook will have all the information needed including due dates and paperwork to be submitted. This information will come out in January. The region will have a Q/A session after SAI information is out as well as a video tutorial session.

Here is a brief overview of the Video Competition for 2022:

Videos

- Video recordings must be unedited and the full competition package – no breaks in the recording.
- Video should be set up to best see whole chorus.
- It is okay for a chorus to do numerous recordings and send in the best.



- Smart phones and tablets can be used for recordings.
- You may have a live audience during recordings.
- Recordings must be made 1-4 weeks before submission. They are due to region on April 4th.
- If videos are not submitted on time, it is like not showing up on the contest stage (a forfeit).
- Each chorus will also be asked to submit a chorus/quartet photo with their video to be used to display winners in Pitchpipe. Can be contest or another photo.

Make-Up/Costumes/Staging/Lighting

- Stage makeup is not required, but makeup should be worn to "look good" on video.
- Special stage lighting is not required.
- Masks can be worn, by all or some, if needed. Judges have training to "hear" through masks.
- Typical costumes should be worn.

Judging

- Judges are being trained to be experienced with all levels of video quality.
- Judges will judge videos on scheduled contest weekend.
- Order of Appearance will be drawn just like past contests. In video each contestant will indicate "contestant number, name of chorus and where they are from and directed by".

Results

- Results will be presented on April 23 at noon during a viewing of the videos at the "Virtual Convention".
- You cannot show videos until after the video presentation on April 23rd.
- Score sheets and medals/trophies will be mailed/delivered later.

Please respond to anyone on the RMT with questions/comment/concerns. The RMT is also

available to assist in the (on-site) video production for your chorus. We are here for you!

Consider everything an experiment...

It's not just our voices that are rusty; our brains and our ears are out of tune. We begin to feel less confident...will we ever get back to our "former glory?" It's now we need to be kind to ourselves and each other. Maybe we can't hit those notes right now that we used to sing with abandon. We need to realize that we are a "work in progress" and

I do remember the first time this year after I was fully vaccinated, singing with my quartet with the tears streaming down my face at the beauty of human voices singing together. And after this first thrill and then directing my own chorus and realizing they were a bit less than stellar right now, I began to take stock of the situation. At every rehearsal there are moments of wonderful, and I love it when we all realize what we're capable of! We are learning to connect with each other and to LISTEN to each other again.

we will eventually find our way back.

Everything I've read lately reminds me that we as singers all need to go back to the basics, to get the voices connected back with the bodies and the breath, and to retrain our ears to connect with the rest of the sound, and the eyes to connect to the director's arms and hands. Maybe focusing on something other than ourselves would be a good start. Let's just remember to be kind to ourselves and patient with those around us. We need to remember that growth is the ultimate goal and is something we can look forward to! It will take patience and self-care to get back to where we were so many months ago, but it will be worth the effort!





Creating Music which comes first; notes or lyrics?

One of the age-old questions that I remember hearing is "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?".

In our Sweet Adeline world with the revised Visual Communication Category (formerly known that the Showmanship Category) we now wonder which comes first, the music or the lyrics. A letter dated January 8, 2021 stated that the focus now seems to be "how the music is communicated to the audience through visual means. For some, the word "showmanship" connotes *flash* and *insincere performance*. The goal is for an authentic, genuine performance that impacts the audience."

Further, they have added a new element to the Visual Communication Category called "Musicality". This refers to the artistic, authentic visual expression of a musical performance.

Wow – now we need to really be *totally involved* in the performance and not just worry about when I move, or a missed note in measure 36.

As a retired chorus director, I have had time now to reflect on how choruses' approach and learn new music. Audiences want to be drawn into our performances emotionally, and performers need to be exciting story tellers.

A few years ago, I read a biography of Frank Sinatra. His approach to a new song was to have the lyric printed on paper with no music shown and to study the lyric for several days before beginning to work on the music. One of his friends said, "He turned a 32-bar song into a three-act play. He taught us that lyrics had periods, commas, semi-colons and question marks. He discovered nuances of meaning in the words." Sinatra's music reminds us of the power of vocal craft and honest expression — and that the two are not mutually exclusive.

WOW!!! Think about it. If we approached our music by FIRST knowing what the song is about - who we are, where we are and how we are feeling – it would be so much easier to learn the notes and let it become exciting music. If we don't understand the lyrics, we will not be able to deliver a believable message to the audience.

<u>Learn lyrics first</u> by saying them. Do this as though you are performing with meaning to someone, not just mouthing words. The live communication frame of mind really helps! It is much better than silent memorization.

Next, understand the form of the song.

Introduction Verse Chorus Key changes Repeats Tag

What is the verse saying about the song? What is the emotion at the key change and beyond? Why is a section repeated? What is the purpose of a tempo change?

Learn the notes. Think about how much easier and more fun it will be to begin to learn the "black dots" on the page with the information about the meaning and style of the song already understood. Too many times, we begin by learning the notes first with no idea about the



style or meaning of the song. (Oh yah, and then the choreographer tells us to assume the character of the song. Huh??)

Let's all learn to once again play "make believe" and become musical story tellers.

When notes and words come alive and are performed together with style and emotion, musical magic happens.

Are you prepared to share a powerful, exciting and emotional performance?
